Fortunately, all of that has changed! These days we grow all of our plants in containers and above ground, which eliminates "transplant shock". We have a forty acre Nursery in Bristol Indiana in which we grow all of our plants above ground and in containers. By growing plants in the containers in which we sell them in, it allows our customers to plant successfully any time of the year, as long as the ground is not frozen!

Bee Friendly!

For several years, our native bee population has been in a major decline. It doesn't seem like a big thing, but in reality, without bees, there would be no fruit or vegetables. No dairy or grains. In short, without bees there would be very little food to offer. Bees are the primary pollinator on just about all plant based material, as well as sustaining the grasslands that our meat producing animals need to graze upon. Todays countryside is slowly transforming into housing developments, shopping districts, highways, and parking lots. Thus, there are fewer native meadows, parks, or just plain open areas.

The new housing market focus is on the home and minimalism is featured in landscapes, but with a few well placed, attractive plants the bees will once again strengthen in numbers. Plant perennials which flower at different times of the season for continuous bloom. Plant masses of annuals for season long bloom. Flowering trees such as Crabapples and Serviceberry. And shrubs like Lilacs, Hydrangeas, and Mock Orange.

Cutting back on Pesticide use or switching to organic products that do not cause harm to bees and other wildlife is also essential.

Mr. Smarty Plants

Pear Mr. Smarty, What can I plant for a showy Summer look, that also provides late season eye appeal?

Signed-Looking for new fashions

Dear New, I would suggest two-season plants. Look for those that have something to offer in more than one season. They are a natural way to extend eye-appeal with an more lasting look. Their Spring & Summer flowers can enhance any yard. Then in Fall, foliage can present a change from the routine green so commonly seen in hot weather. Add some leaf appeal! You can choose from fiery red or crimson, beaming gold or soft yellow, pumpkin orange thru various shades of burgundy, purple, and even bronze tones.

Successful accent color placement is usually dependant on contrast with surrounding plants to get that special item noticed. Ambient light and time of day also affect color perception. Some colors (blues & reds) seem to disappear in evening light, while others like white and soft yellow can become more pronounced, creating a "Night Garden" effect.

Also consider Evergreens. Evergreen selections can present a wide variety of Autumn colors on a more subtle level. Many varieties of Juniper, Cypress, and Yew commonly appear in single shades of green in the bright light of Summer. Some can come in interesting gold tones, or have splashes and flecks of yellow. As day length shortens in Fall, natural light appears different as well. The soft tones of Conifers and needled evergreens come more to the forefront, later in the growing season. Some examples are Russian Cypress and Andorra Juniper, both of which get unique color changes prior to Winter. Some plants that have leaves which at first glance look like they would drop them in Fall, actually don't do that at all. They are considered to be Broad-leaved evergreens. They include plants like: Cotoneaster, Erica, most Holly, Myrtle, Rhododendron and Azaleas, and Pieris. Trees can be evergreen too, as can shrubs, low growers, and groundcover plants.

Bear in mind, that wonderful plant you noticed on vacation may have been considered to be evergreen where you were, but may loose it's leaves here. Enlist the aid of a professional designer to determine what will work best for your soil type, and the natural light of your location. They can help you get your yard dressed in a charming, yet distinctive look.
