

The Elements of Landscape Design

In order to create a pleasing, well-conceived space, I follow these five basic tenets of great landscape design:

<u>Scale:</u> I select ornamental trees like Weeping Cherry, Tree Hydrangea and Flowering Dogwoods to create height and a sense of dimension. A lot of the time, this becomes a focal point.

<u>Color:</u> I always want contrasting colors against a home. If the colors are similar,

they will blend or not show. For example; purple leaved plants and trees in front of a brown home blend in, where in front of a yellow home, they'd show up beautifully. It's important to offset formality with widely contrasting hues of both flowers and foliage.

Structure: When I design a residential landscape, I like to incorporate paths that encourage visitors to stroll and pause, as well as emphasize specimen and important rare plants. I also create areas that display examples of single species by planting masses to create a large impact.

Texture: When selecting a pallet of plants, I like to choose shrubs and flow-

ers with leaves of diverse sizes, shapes, and texture. For example, the openness and airiness of Liriope in front of a Boxwood Hedge gives a lovely contrast of textures.

Ornamentation: I love garden ornaments (that's why our Garden Centre is packed full of them). Urns, birdbaths, statues, sun spheres, fountains and sculptures all add interest and help to underscore a garden's design, even when plants and flowers aren't in full bloom. A word of caution: I'd love to sell you every piece of garden art that we have, but in <u>all</u> cases, a little bit goes a long way! Garden ornaments should be limited to just one (or a pair if using urns) per each area.

What's Cooking?

Spinach, Strawberry, and Hearts of Palm Salad

1/3 C. cider vinegar 3/4 C. sugar 2 Tbl. fresh lemon juice 1 Tsp. salt 1 C. vegetable oil 1/2 sm. red onion, grated 1 1/2 Tbl. poppy seeds 1 Tsp. dry mustard 1/2 Tsp. paprika



1 1/2 lbs. fresh spinach, washed & torn into pieces 1 can hearts of palm, drained & chopped

2 C. strawberries, stemmed & sliced

1 C. chopped walnuts

For the dressing, combine the vinegar, sugar, lemon juice, and salt in a small non-reactive saucepan and heat over medium heat until the sugar dissolves, stirring frequently. Remove pan from heat and let cool to room temp. When cooled, whisk in the oil, onion, poppy seeds, dry mustard and paprika until thoroughly combined. Set dressing aside. In a salad bowl, combine spinach, hearts of palm, strawberries, and walnuts. When ready to serve, add some of the dressing, and toss gently. Serve the remaining dressing alongside the salad so diners may add more. Yield: 12 servings.

Wisteria

For most practical purposes, wisteria is Chinese (Wisteria sinensis) or Japanese (Wisteria floribunda). Both species, and the varieties within them, have more or less the same growth habits and requirements, although the Chinese varieties tend to be less hardy and less fragrant. Both species feature cultivars that bloom in pendulous clusters of lavender or white. Wisteria have an unusually long adolescence and at best might not blossom for 15 years; so the older the plant you start with, the sooner it will bloom. Plants grown from grafts (the safest method) will jump start those 15 years considerably.

Choose a location away from the house,

to avoid structural damage-an arbor, an arched trellis, a pergola. You need a location in full sun for at least six hours a day. Wisteria likes reasonably fertile, well-drained soil in an area that is not likely to dry out.

Wisteria can be manipulated

in various ways-as bonsai, for example, or trained as a standard-but pruning demands are rigorous. The only time wisteria should not be pruned is in early spring, because it blooms at this time.
