Did You Know . . .

As spring approaches in the water garden, make sure the leaves are kept out of the bottom of the pond. Don't feed the fish until the water warms into the upper 40's, and use wheat germ based foods when you do feed. Fertilize plants only after growth begins on bog plants and after leaves have reached the surface for water lillies. Don't forget to lift potted plants to the surface if they were placed on the bottom of the pond for winter.



What's Cooking?

Rice Italiano

1 C. uncooked long grain rice 2 eggs, slightly beaten 1/2 C. grated Parmesan cheese 2 C shredded Mozzarella cheese 3/4 C. cottage cheese 1 Lb. lean ground beef 1 jar (15.5 oz) spaghetti sauce Italian seasoning, to taste Parmesan cheese, to taste

Cook rice according to package directions. Cool slightly. Add eggs and 1/2 C of Parmesan cheese, mix well, set aside. Combine cheeses, mix well. Brown meat and drain off excess fat.

Sprinkle with Italian seasoning to taste. Add spaghetti sauce and continue cooking until thoroughly heated. Spoon rice mixture into 2 Qt. casserole dish.

Cover with the cheese mixture and top with meat sauce. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese to taste. Bake at 375 degrees 20-25 minutes or until heated through. Serves 6 to 8.
