#### A Victory Garden?

In the 1940's Americans answered a call from the U.S. government to help feed our troops. And we did a marvelous job by providing 9-10 million tons of fresh fruits and vegetables. Now in an effort to save money and help feed our own families, many of us will be trying to grow our own fruits and vegetables.

Some plants are better grown from seed and some from seedlings. Those best started from seed are beans, carrots, peas, beets and turnips. The best seedlings are tomatoes, peppers, watermelons, onions, herbs, garlic, raspberries and blueberries.

First decide what you are going to plant. That should not be too difficult, just let your palette decide for you. What is delicious to you?

Next is location. Fruits and vegetables need at least 6 hours of sunlight a day. And remember, you can incorporate fruits and vegetables into your existing landscape. Have you ever heard of a book called "Roses Love Garlic"? It is a book about companion planting. How about a pole bean teepee next to your daylilies? Or planting onions and garlic around your flower garden? That will help keep deer and rabbits away from your tastiest ornamental plants. What about a blueberry bush next to your clematis? It is a great shrub that stands about 5 feet tall, with beautiful white blooms and it produces delicious berries.

Now that you have a location, make sure irrigation is nearby. Annuals need more water and nutrients than most perennials. They expend a lot of energy in producing flowers and fruits in a short period of time and need to replenish it.

After these decisions have been made, the real fun begins with getting our hands dirty. Plants need a good foundation to become and stay healthy. That starts with good rich soil. To do this, incorporate composted cow manure or peat moss into the existing soil. Doing this helps your plants get off to a healthy start. A healthy plant can fight off disease and insect problems better that a sick one. They also produce more fruit/blooms.

Here are some pointers for taking care of your plants once they are planted:

When you water your plants, try to water them early in the day so that the water on the leaves has a chance to dry before the evening. This helps reduce many fungal disease issues. Remove the fruit when it ripens and your plant will produce more. If you leave the fruit to rot on the plant your plant will cease in producing as much fruit. Inspect your plant regularly. This is a good way to find problems early enough to remedy them.

When preserving your fruits and vegetables, please do it safely. Some of the ways our grandmothers preserved foods are no longer safe for our time. The best up to date information I have found is from the University of Georgia, in a book called "So Easy To Preserve". It is scientifically based, for safe food handling.

I hope I have inspired you to try to grow your own garden. If you have any questions or need additional information, please stop by our Garden Centre and our staff of experts will help you. I hope you have a delicious second

- You will then be free to move out to our annual area and pick up whatever plants your heart desires (or if you prefer, we could also help you assemble a mini conifer container, like our fairy garden).
- During this time we will check on you to see if you have any questions.
- When you are finished and satisfied with your containers we will come around and total your purchases (plant/container costs).
- At this time you will have the option of adding a delivery service, if you feel that your containers are too heavy for you or your vehicle.
- You may then pay and leave at your leisure.

This workshop is a great opportunity to bring in your own containers and get them done with unlimited options. It will give you a chance to ask questions, and get answers from our professional staff. #### **ASK IRIS**

Dear Iris,

Late spring when my bulbs are all finished blooming, what should I do to care for them? Signed, Enlighten

Dear Enlighten,

Bulb and corm plants usually only bloom for a short 1-2 weeks. With a little research and planning, you can have a bed of bright blooms coming and going over several months. After your colorful show has passed its prime, you can cut off the faded flowers and stems. Allow the leaves to grow to maturity so they will continue producing chlorophyll for food which will be stored in the bulb below ground for next Spring. Don't remove the leaves until they have yellowed and browned.

For most Spring bloomers, the leaves can be removed whenever hot weather comes, mid-to-late summer. Most bulbs, but not all, benefit from lifting and dividing every year or two. Tulips, Daffodils, Crocus, Fritilleria, and the shade lover bulbs need not be moved or divided at all, unless they are showing signs of decline. By the 3rd year in the ground, they may be smaller in size and have fewer blooms. This is an indication that they need nutritional attention or are overcrowded. The larger sized Tulips may need lifting more often more frequently. By enriching the soil and dividing the bulbs, you will be guaranteed large colorful blooms every year. Divide and sort dug bulbs by size, and plan ahead to replant immediately so the roots will not dry out. Relocate the smaller bulbs from your dug up cluster to an inconspicuous location until they get bigger. Replant the larger bulbs in an obvious spot to attract the most attention.

#### SPRING VEGETABLE SALAD WITH BUTTERMILK Dressing

1 ½ cups asparagus, cut into 2" lengths

10 medium baby carrots, halved lengthwise if thick

1 cup sugar snap peas, stem ends snipped

1 medium English cucumber, halved lengthwise, thinly sliced

1/3 cup buttermilk

3 tbsp reduced-calorie mayonnaise

2 tsp apple cider vinegar

½ tsp Dijon mustard

1/4 tsp table salt

1/4 tsp black pepper, freshly ground

2 tbsp chives, fresh, sliced

2 tsp dill, fresh, chopped

6 cups mixed baby greens

4 oz semisoft goat cheese, crumbled

Bring a large skillet half full of water to a boil. Add asparagus and carrots; cook 1 minute. Add sugar snap peas; cook until vegetables are crisp-tender, about 1 to 2 minutes more. Drain, rinse under cold water until cool and drain again. Put vegetables in a medium bowl and add cucumbers; toss to mix.

In a small bowl, whisk together buttermilk, mayonnaise, vinegar, mustard, salt and pepper until smooth; stir in chives and dill.

To serve, place 1 ½ cups of salad greens on each of 4 salad plates. Place about 1 cup of vegetable mixture in center of each; drizzle each with about 3 tablespoons of dressing and 1 ounce of goat cheese.

Makes 4 servings.

#### WMWMW Linton's New Plant Introductions WMWMWM

Hello, everyone! I hope you are off to a GREAT gardening start this year! I am so excited about this year's new plant introductions. Wow! What great plants! We have lots of new trees, shrubs, roses, flowers, & vines to talk about. I will be telling you a little bit about them in our spring, summer, & fall newsletter this year according to its season of interest.

Well, let's start with some exciting groundcovers. We have an amazing new Lily-of-the-Valley to introduce this year. It is extremely rare, and a real collector's item. This new breakthrough has gold variegated leaves that are perfectly pinstriped. A real eye catcher! We also have 2 very exciting new Ajugas. The first is called 'Party Colors'. It is an absolute rainbow of color, starting with the leaves that range from green and white to reddish pinks and purples. The second is called 'Sparkler'. It definitely is! Sparkler Ajuga has wonderful dark green leaves with creamy-white splashes. In winter the variegation turns to an amazing pink.

A new tree with a "Heart of Gold" is sure to get everyone's attention at the Garden Centre this spring. A new variety of Redbud. Yes, that's right, Redbud. Its beautiful leaves emerge as a coppery red, then turn to an amazing gold color that will NOT scorch in the hot summer sun. This is all in addition to the flower show you get first thing in the spring.

Come and see our brand new variety of Forsythia called 'Citrus Swizzle'. It is the first variegated form of the Bronx Dwarf Forsythia which only gets 18-24" tall. Leaves on this beauty start out edged in gold, and as the summer progresses, turn into a creamy white. A new variety of Caryopteris (Blue Mist Shrub) called 'Hint of Gold', should have been named "Screaming Siren" of Gold. Wow, very bright leaves will mix with blue flowers by June. We are offering a brand new variety of bush Honeysuckle called 'Cool Splash'. It is

the very first variegated form of this genus, and gets 3-4' tall and wide.

We have a couple of new grasses to introduce. The first is a new variety of feather reed grass called 'Eldorado'. It has very bright gold variegation that absolutely radiates in the sunshine. The next grasses are both what we call "switch grass", because of their flowers in the fall. Prairie Fire has blue green foliage that turns wine red by very early summer with rosy flowers, and Huron Solstice turns an even deeper wine red with deep purple flowers. I mention both of these grasses now in the spring because you can enjoy the foliage early on in the season, and because we have limited quantities.

And finally, let's talk about new perennials. Wow, where do I start. We have 3 new Columbines in the "Winky Series"; blue and white, red and white, & all white. A great new variety of goat's beard called 'Misty Lace'; 'King's Ransom' heartleaf brunnera; 'Coconut Punch', 'Dragon Fruit', & 'Apple Slice' from the new "Fruit Punch" series of dianthus; 'Candy Mountain' & 'Goldcrest' Foxglove; a double flowering variety of perennial geranium called hima Plenum; 2 new varieties of shasta daisy called 'Christine Hageman' & 'Old Court'; an awesome PINK flowering and a variegated form of forget-me-nots; great new varieties of creeping phlox like 'Scarlet Flame' & 'Fort Hill'; 4 new varieties of lungwort called 'Bubble Gum', 'Excalibur', 'Silver Shimmers', & 'Victorian Brooch'; and finally one of my personal favorites...catchfly 'Rolly's Favorite'. I don't know who Rolly is, but he picked a great plant.
