Heavenly Hydrangeas

It is easy to understand why hydrangeas are consistently one of the top sellers in garden centers around the country. Regardless of the species or variety, they are adored for their long season of blooms and varied forms. Their long lasting, large blossoms are excellent for fresh or dried arrangements indoors, as well. Here at Linton's, we carry the areas largest selection of hydrangeas (over 40 different varieties). It's not too late in the year to install one of these beautiful plants in your landscape. I'll help you through the shopping process. Being pregnant, I compare everything these days to ICE CREAM.

Hydrangeas, like ice cream, can be divided into several categories (ice cream, frozen yogurt, etc.). The 2 main categories are macrophylla (which are bigleaf) & paniculata (which are panicle). The "bigleaf" varieties (probably the most popular) are best in part shade to full sun with plenty of soil moisture. These varieties bloom on both old and new wood, so when it comes to pruning questions, you are better off to ask one of our expert staff which particular variety you have. The "panicle" varieties are the ones most everyone associates with a tree form (even though they just as often are pruned as a large shrub). These varieties are best in full sun & bloom on new wood, so it is best to prune them heavily in early spring. Some additional categories of hydrangeas include: Oakleaf, Climbing, & Smooth (like Annabelle).

Then, within each category, we have different flavors or varieties. The bigleaf hydrangea probably has the most expansive "flavor" list. We have hydrangeas in white, pink, red, blue, purple, & bi-color. HMMM....what color do I want? Well that's easily solved, too. If you prefer a cool blue or purple-ish tone, add the recommended dose of Aluminum Sulphate. If you prefer a rich red or pink-ish tone, add lime. Perhaps you don't have any or too few blooms, then try adding a "super" phosphate fertilizer (such as Fertilome's Blooming & Rooting Soluble Plant Food). If that doesn't work, you may need to move your hydrangea to a location where it will receive more sun.

So no matter what your landscape situation is, you are sure to find a hydrangea that will work for you. Come visit us at Linton's and let us help you scoop one up!

A Brilliant Autumn Show

As autumn approaches, the kids go back to school (yeah!), the weather becomes cooler, apples are aplenty and the colors of the trees bring us a spectacular show of reds, oranges and yellows. While some of our perennials are starting to fade and get ready for old man winter, others are just getting started. In Autumn, the landscape is usually graced by the foliage of the trees. But, if your landscape lacks these brilliant specimens, the fall flowers must take on a larger role in our gardens.

Some people believe that fall plants are too limited and often avoid planting in the fall. Let me tell you about some astounding plants to maximize the enjoyment of your yard before the first heavy snowfall.

Fall annuals? Yes, absolutely! Annuals add astounding color to the landscape and perform well. Pansies add a splash of color, and with so many new varieties, it is going to be hard to choose. The mammoth pansy has a larger flower for a more visual impact. Winter survivors are also a great choice. These are pansies which will bloom for the fall season until a hard freeze, and then reappear in spring. You can't beat that! Cabbage and Kale are also beautiful. They like cooler weather and as we have a few frosts the cabbage will change colors. Some turn white, purple, pink, or red depending on the variety you choose. Sunflowers are a very popular plant in the fall garden. They can be cut and placed in floral arrangements bringing the outdoors, in. Mums and asters also add beautiful color to the landscape. They come in a wide variety of colors and styles. Mums can also be a perennial in the garden. To keep your mums plants full and bushy, trim the tops an inch or two in the beginning of June and again, right around the fourth of July. This will help them stay compact and produce more blooms.

There are many perennials that have great fall interest. Mr. Good Bud and Autumn Joy Sedum are very good choices. Their blooms turn brilliant colors in the cooler weather. Hypericum or St. John's Wort, blooms in the summer. Then as the blooms disappear, small berries in red and orange appear in the fall. They can be used in fresh cut floral arrangements. The ever popular ornamental grasses also show wonderful texture and color in autumn. Maiden Grass turns red, yellow, and beige in the fall. While purple Love Grass turns a reddish purple as the weather changes. Blue Oat Grass has beautiful seed heads that float above the foliage in the autumn breeze.

Shrubs are also a great way to add color in the landscape. Fothergilla has white flowers in the spring and the foliage is a blueish green in the summer, which then turns red and orange in the fall. The burning bush is also a very colorful shrub. It turns to a bright red color as the seasons change and is very easy to grow. There are also Red Twig and Arctic Sun Dogwoods. After the foliage falls due to cold weather, the twigs turn brilliant colors. Arctic sun branches turn to a yellowish-orange and the red twig turns red. Which one would you choose?

So as you see, there are many plants which will bring more fall color into your garden. It extends the season a bit longer before the snow flies and the shovels appear. Visit our garden centre to explore some new plants to add to your landscape!

Eco-friendly Kitchen Options

Choose Matches Over Lighters - Most lighters are made out of plastic and filled with butane fuel, both petroleum products. Since most lighters are considered "disposable," over 1.5 billion end up in landfills each year. When choosing matches, pick cardboard over wood. Wood matches come from trees, whereas most cardboard matches are made from recycled paper.

Don't Use Liquid Dishwashing Detergents - Dish and laundry liquids are mostly water (up to 80 percent). While the double and triple compact concentrates reduce that amount, it still costs energy and packaging to bring this water to the consumer. Also, liquid detergents come in plastic packaging; whereas, powdered detergents are packaged in cardboard- another green perk. For other water saving tips, check out thegreenguide.com.

Don't Rinse the Dishes - Skip rinsing dishes before using your dishwasher and save up to 20 gallons of water each load. Plus, you're saving time and the energy used to heat the additional water.

Don't Pre-Heat the Oven - Unless you are making bread or pastries of some sort, don't pre-heat the oven. Just turn it on when you put the dish in. Also, when checking on your food, look through the oven window instead of opening the door.

Turn Off the Oven Early - Simply turn your oven off ten minutes before the end of the actual cooking time and allow the residual heat to complete the process. By doing this alone, you can save around 1600 kw of electricity per year.

Go Vegetarian Once Per Week - One less meat -based meal a week helps the planet and your diet. For example: It requires 2,500 gallons of water to produce one pound of beef. You will also save some trees. For each hamburger that originated from animals raised on rainforest land, approximately 55 square feet of forest have been destroyed.

Spring & Autumn

Dear Spring & Autumn,

Trees always add immeasurably to any landscape, improving it's overall visual appearance and adding to quality of life. They reduce water run-off, filter out pollutants, and generate fresh oxygen, as well as provide hours of relaxing enjoyment. Begin your selection by being an educated shopper...the number one cause of tree death by humans is selecting the wrong tree for the site.

First, determine why the tree is being planted: for seasonal color or blossoms; to provide light or dense shade; fruit for wildlife; or as a windbreak/privacy screen. What about the site for the tree? Does the space lend itself to the mature size of the tree you were considering? Are there overhead or under-ground utilities that would interfere with roots or branches? Micro climates within our zone can be created by driveways, walks and buildings, so consult a professional if necessary. Trees are carefully bred for resistance to pests and diseases, drought tolerance and physical characteristics. Containerized or balled & burlaped stock experience less transplant shock than dug trees.

Here's a few suggestions: Color - Crimson King Maple, Birch, Japanese Maple; Flowers - Thundercloud Plum, Rose of Sharon; Wildlife Fruit - Serviceberry, Crabapple 'Merlot'; Conifers - Arborvitae, Hemlock, Upright Juniper; Unique Shade - Tulip Poplar, Tri-color Beech, Dawn Redwood, Locust.

Flowering Plants **Speed Surgery Recovery**

Research has confirmed the beneficial effects of plants and flowers for patients recovering from abdominal surgery. A recent study by Seong-Hyun Park and Richard H. Mattson, researchers from the Department of Horticulture, Recreation and Forestry at Kansas State University, provides strong evidence that contact with plants is directly beneficial to a hospital patient's health. Patients with plants in their rooms had significantly fewer intakes of pain medication, more positive physiological responses (lower blood pressure and heart rate), less pain, anxiety, fatigue, and higher satisfaction with their recovery rooms than their counterparts in the control group without plants in their rooms.

Organize Tools

Before we know it, winter will soon be upon us. Get your gardening supplies in order before the next planting season. An old rake head can serve as a rack for hand tools; secure it to a toolshed wall with appropriate hardware. Hang trowels, weeders, hoes, and shears from the tines with leather cord. If the handles don't have holes, use an electric drill fitted with a 3/16" bit to make them.

What's Cooking?

Sweet Potato Muffins

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour

1/4 tsp salt

1 cup whole wheat flour

3/4 cup light brown sugar

4 tsp baking powder

1 egg, lightly beaten

1 tsp cinnamon

1/4 cup melted butter

½ tsp nutmeg

1 cup milk

1 cup cooked, mashed sweet potato Heat oven to 275 degrees. In a large bowl, mix the flours, baking powder, cinnamon, nutmeg, salt and ½ cup brown sugar. In another bowl, lightly beat the egg. Add the butter, milk and sweet potato and combine well.

Pour the sweet potato mixture into the flour mixture and stir until the dry ingredients are blended. Fill greased muffin tins. Sprinkle the batter with the remaining brown sugar. Bake for 15 to 20 minutes or until a tester inserted into the center of a muffin comes out clean. Makes 18 muffins.
